For over 45 years WWOZ has been deeply committed to all things New Orleans.

Since 1980, WWOZ has grown from a small station operated out of a beer storage room above Tipitina's music club to an ever-expanding multimedia organization followed locally and worldwide via our radio waves, live video streams, and social media platforms.

In 2025, WWOZ's global presence continued to grow as millions tuned in–our YouTube Channel alone surpassed 10 million views! We also celebrated one year in our new home atop the iconic JAX Brewery.

LOCAL IMPACT

Our local and worldwide listenership continued to grow this year, a testament to WWOZ's significant global impact.

WWOZ has received continued acclaim and support from around the country and the world. We have been ambassadors promoting the music, history and culture of Louisiana and New Orleans to record audiences.

In 2025, WWOZ broadcast more than 190 live music performances, showcasing the skill and artistry of more than 975 individual musicians from our studios and from festivals and venues around New Orleans. Millions have tuned in, watched OZ videos, shared our social media, accessed our online archive, Groovapedia, and Fested in Place from their homes.



On December 4th, 1980, WWOZ was awarded its federal broadcast license-the only caveat was that it had to be on the air within 24 hours! Since the station had no physical base at the time, program hosts taped shows at home and rushed them to the transmitter to get them on the air.





That's when WWOZ was born and became instantly dedicated to giving airplay to authentic New Orleans music. No one could have predicted the worldwide, multi-platform success WWOZ has become, or the path we took to get here. Whether we were broadcasting from the beer storage room above Tipitina's, the Treehouse in Armstrong Park, The French Market or from our current beautiful home atop Jax Brewery, we have remained true to our mission to be the worldwide voice, archive, and flagbearer of New Orleans culture and musical heritage.

WWOZ is a community public radio station powered by the voices of over 75 volunteer show hosts, a small dedicated staff and over one hundred committed behind-the-scenes volunteers.

In 2025, our Show Hosts, many with decades of experience, volunteered more than 8,400 hours with WWOZ.

WWOZ Show Hosts independently decide what to play to craft their broadcast presentation. Each host brings their own unique musical sensibility, knowledge, experience and community perspective to share with our local and worldwide audience.





Guardian Angels of the Groove

This summer we learned that federal funding for WWOZ totaling \$400,000 annually had been revoked. In an attempt to make up for the significant loss to our annual budget, we launched the Guardian Angels of the Groove campaign in July.

We are thrilled and thankful that we raised \$412,000 from 1,794 Guardian Angels of the Groove from around the globe!

This crucial funding will be used for important infrastructure necessities including upkeep and maintenance for our broadcast transmitter, equipment, and internet streaming for our worldwide audience.










WWOZ Live Broadcasts

WWOZ is the Jazz and Heritage station broadcasting live, local music everywhere in the universe from our studio to the Fair Grounds and beyond!

In 2025, WWOZ broadcast more than 190 live music performances, showcasing the skill and artistry of more than 975 individual musicians, from our studios atop Jax Brewery and from festivals and venues around New Orleans.

This includes the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival, The Crescent City Blues & BBQ Festival, French Quarter Festival, The Jazz and Heritage Concert Series, The Louisiana Cajun-Zydeco Festival, The Treme Creole Gumbo Festival, Congo Square Rhythms Festival, BlackAmericana Fest and many performances from WWOZ's own studios.

Musicians and fans alike are deeply committed to the station. We regularly hear stories about how WWOZ has brought them together. Our musicians love to return to the station after touring the world to share their stories of fans who first heard their music on WWOZ and, as a result, decided to come and support them on their tour.









Festing in Place

On October 2 through 5, WWOZ's Festing in Place returned for our annual deep dive into great archival recordings of the best New Orleans musicians!



WWOZ's Global Audience

When we say our audience is "worldwide", we're not kidding! In the map below both shades of green cover ALL countries and territories where we have regular listeners! The darker green represents higher concentrations of audience. The gray areas with the crosshatches are not generating traffic on our site. These include North Korea and certain places in Africa (Western Sahara, Republic of the Congo, Chad, Eswatini). This illustrates the station's incredible impact and that we truly do have Guardians of the Groove Around the World!








Takin' It To The Streets

Takin' It to the Streets® is WWOZ's multiplatform program celebrating New Orleans' social aid & pleasure clubs, second lines, Black Masking Indians, Baby Dolls, and brass band traditions.

Takin' It To The Streets includes a weekly podcast of interviews with social & pleasure club officers and Black Masking Indians, Baby Dolls, brass band musicians, and more. These award-winning, peer-level interviews are important documentation of an aspect of New Orleans culture that no other media outlet covers with such consistency, detail, or authenticity. The resulting WWOZ programming is authentic and far deeper than the "outsider looking in" perspective that is often given to the clubs and Indians on this unique aspect of New Orleans culture.

In 2025, WWOZ continued our interview series hosted by India "Indi the Doll" Sever, and documented a number of the parades, Black Masking Indians, brass bands, and Baby Dolls on video, including Mardi Gras in Treme, Super Sunday, the kickoff parade of the 2025-26 second line parade season, and more.

Takin' It To The Streets continues to document the communities that keep New Orleans' parading and cultural traditions alive. Interviews covered topics including the passing of some of New Orleans' culture bearers, the origins of various social aid & pleasure clubs, how club members, masking Indians, and Baby Dolls support their communities year-round. Also addressed were the impacts of climate change on New Orleans' parading culture, how decisions are made

internally within clubs and tribes, the importance of mentorship and young people, the evolution of traditions in recent years, and more. <u>Listen to the 2025 Takin' it to the Streets interviews here.</u>

WWOZ Video

WWOZ's videos attracted more than two million views in 2025 between YouTube, Facebook, Instagram, and Threads. Facebook was our fastest growing video distribution platform this year, gaining 12,000 new followers. YouTube also remains healthy, gaining nearly 4,600 new subscribers in 2025. Our YouTube channel hit two significant milestones this year, topping 10 million total views and more than 45,000 subscribers! More than 1.2 million of those YouTube views were added in 2025, and our video content was viewed over 375,000 times on Facebook.





In the first months of the year, our video team hit the streets to capture what was happening for Mardi Gras 2025 including scenes from the streets throughout downtown, Baby Dolls, parades, celebrations on Mardi Gras Day, and more.

Our videos for Takin' It To The Streets, WWOZ's multi-platform program celebrating New Orleans' social aid & pleasure clubs, second lines, Black Masking Indians, Baby Dolls, and brass band traditions, were some of the most watched of the year with features from Mardi Gras and Super Sunday in March and April, and the announcement of the 2025-26 second line parade season schedule leading the way.

Additionally, WWOZ live streamed dozens of events produced by the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Foundation in 2025, including concerts from the George and Joyce Wein Jazz & Heritage Center and performances at the Congo Square Rhythms Festival, Louisiana Cajun Zydeco Festival, Crescent City Blues & BBQ





Festival, and Treme Creole Gumbo Fest, plus the Allison Miner Series and the Tom Dent Lecture Series. 2025 was also the first year we streamed live from the independent Black Americana Music Fest.

WWOZ Video produced a number of unique features this year, including New Orleans Re-Creates The Beatles'
Rooftop Concert with The Walrus at WWOZ, John
"Prince" Gilbert's funeral, coverage of the Womex event in Manchester, England, and the Mystic Seven Sisters on the streets of Treme at dawn on Mardi Gras Day.

WWOZ video streamed dozens of performances from our new Gia Maione Prima Foundation Studio this year, including Kumasi, Soul Brass Band, Kyle Roussel, Pres Hall Brass Band, Lynn Drury, Little Freddie King, Larry Sieberth, Brian Haas, Bonerama, Brad Walker, Cha Wa, and more.





WWOZ.org

WWOZ's website continues to be a growing and powerful platform. In 2025, 953,223 unique visitors explored <a href="https://www.commons.org/www

WWOZ was one of the first radio stations in the country to start streaming live on the internet (1994), and has since grown into an information hub providing visitors access not only to our live stream, but also to New Orleans musical and cultural content unavailable anywhere else.



WWOZ.org allows 'OZillians from around the world to feel connected to the city (whether they were born here or feel like they should have been). In 2025, listeners tuned in to WWOZ's live stream from all 50 states, Washington DC, and 216 countries, and 1.3 million streamers racked up 8.4 million total hours listening-- more than double our 2024 totals!

WWOZ Livewire


The Livewire is New Orleans' most comprehensive live music listings calendar. In 2025, we entered over 31,000 live music events into the WWOZ Livewire Music Calendar. The Livewire generated 979,220 page views (a 41% increase over 2023), making it the second most visited place on the site.

Two Week Archive

Fans can go back and listen to a running two week Streaming Archive of all the shows and performances on WWOZ. The Two-Week Archive includes every show every week. It has been especially popular during the weeks after Festing in Place events. In 2025, the Two-Week Archive was the fifth most popular page on the site and served re-streams of over 850,000 shows.

WWOZ Blogs

WWOZ show hosts and staff collaborate to generate posts surrounding events, music news, and other cultural information of interest to our audience. In 2025, blog posts generated 169,017 page views, with the most popular posts addressing topics like local Grammy Award nominees and winners, photo highlights from festivals throughout Louisiana, show host profiles, news of special broadcasts and shows, and more.





WWOZ Social Media

2025 was a year of continued growth for WWOZ's social media. We use our social presence to bring Louisiana and its musical culture to our worldwide audience. Our engagement with the social media audience has consistently risen across multiple platforms.

When deciding how to use social media, our guiding principle is to bring New Orleans and its musical culture to our audience no matter where they live.














A Closer Walk: Interactive New Orleans Music History Map

WWOZ continues to expand on this important Interactive New Orleans Music History Map! A Closer Walk maps more than a century of New Orleans' great musical moments and historical sites. It's an indispensable guide to exploring New Orleans music history, either via the curated tours, or by exploring "a la carte" any of the individual music history sites. The website is optimized for mobile devices so users can head out with smartphones or tablets for a self-guided tour. In 2025, A Closer Walk continued to serve as an authoritative resource for researchers and journalists, including a major presentation on the current state of historic and cultural preservation in New Orleans today.

Tributes

Lillian Boutte

Renowned New Orleans vocalist Lillian Boutté died May 23, at the age of 75. Boutté's career and influence stretched far beyond her hometown. She recorded and toured extensively with Allen Toussaint and Dr. John. She played multiple roles in the New Orleans cast of the groundbreaking musical One Mo Time, which then took her to tours of Europe. In the early 1980s she assembled a band to tour overseas, and became a star performing in theaters and on television in Europe.



For more than three decades, Boutté made her home abroad, performing and promoting the spirit of New Orleans music across international stages. Along the way, she helped bring countless fellow musicians with her, offering them opportunities to perform and grow beyond the city's borders. Her music was rooted in New Orleans, but was not strictly traditional jazz, incorporating New Orleans music from gospel onward.

In 1986 Boutté was named "New Orleans Musical Ambassador" by Mayor Ernest "Dutch" Morial, only the second person to hold that title after the city's first Ambassador, Louis Armstrong. Part of the city's famed Boutté musical lineage, Lillian was the older sister of singer John Boutté and related to many others in the family's rich musical tradition.



Lawrence Ketchens

New Orleans musician Dr. Lawrence Ketchens II passed away January 31. He was a beloved husband to Doreen Ketchens, as well as a devoted father, friend, and musician. Lawrence was most recognized as a member of Doreen's Jazz, playing tuba, valve trombone, drums, and piano alongside his wife. He held a doctorate degree in music from Five Towns College. Lawrence taught himself to play jazz, and used his classical versatility to develop an original style of tuba playing. He also had a fun streak, and was the first to play the sousaphone and drums simultaneously! Lawrence also arranged and produced music for Doreen's Jazz and master classes. Besides Doreen, Lawrence shared the stage with many musical luminaries, including Pete Fountain, Trombone Shorty, Al Hirt, Jon Faddis, Teddy Riley, Danny Barker, and others.





Brown Sugar

Former WWOZ show host Belle "Brown Sugar" Moore died on January 22, 2025. She served as a DJ on WWOZ from the late 1980s until 2004, and also led our membership department for a number of years.

Brown Sugar was born and raised in New Orleans and attended Booker T. Washington High School. She grew up listening to gospel and the blues, a passion for which she brought to the airwaves on 'OZ. "I built up a following real fast when I started playing blues on WWOZ because I played music the listeners could really feel. My audience age range was from geriatric to pediatric and everything in between."

Brown Sugar was well-regarded by many WWOZ listeners. Bob Dylan, himself, referenced Brown Sugar in his autobiography, Chronicles, Vol. I: "At the house on Audubon Place the radio was always on in the kitchen and always tuned to WWOZ, the great New Orleans station that plays mostly early rhythm and blues and rural South gospel music. My favorite DJ, hands down, was Brown Sugar, the female disc jockey. She was on in the midnight hours, played records by Wynonie Harris, Roy Brown, Ivory Joe Hunter, Little Walter, Lightnin' Hopkins, Chuck Willis, all the greats. She used to keep me company a lot when everyone else was sleeping. Brown Sugar, whoever she was, had a thick, slow, dreamy, oozing molasses voice--she sounded as big as a buffalo--she'd ramble on, take phone calls, give love advice and

spin records. I wondered how old she could be. I wondered if she knew her voice had drawn me in, filled me with inner peace and serenity and would upend all my frustration. It was relaxing listening to her. I'd stare at the radio. Whatever she said, I could see every word as she said it. I could listen to her for hours. Wherever she was, I wished I could put all of myself in there."


